## Results of Operations

As at June 30, 2023, CC&L Alternative Income Fund (the “Fund”) held \$27.4 million in total net assets. During the period, investors in Series A units in the Fund experienced a return of 1.19%. The benchmark for the Fund (FTSE Canada 91 Day TBill Index) returned 2.14% over the period. The performance of the different series within the funds will vary due to the differences in their expense structures. For specific returns by series, please refer to the “Past Performance” section of this report.

The first quarter of 2023 proved to be a whirlwind for global financial markets. Initially, there was positive market sentiment driven by strong economic data, China’s economy reopening and subdued inflation releases. However, this positive sentiment was short-lived as unusually strong economic and inflation data caused financial markets to question the endpoint of central bank interest rate hikes and the probability and timing of a recession. In March, markets faced a significant shock when a confluence of factors led to a bank run across U.S. regional banks that ultimately resulted in the second and third largest U.S. bank failures in history.

Despite support from the federal regulators, the turbulence spilled over to Europe with the collapse of Switzerland’s Credit Suisse, a systematically important financial institution, which was ultimately merged with its largest domestic peer. During this time, bond market volatility surged, with near-historic moves in yields. Equity market volatility increased, and although there was a decline in financial stocks in response to the threat of contagion and concerns of a larger banking troubles, overall equity markets held in quite well. After a volatile March, investors welcomed a more stable market environment in the second quarter.

Sentiment improved due to several factors, including the resolution of the US debt ceiling and the growing enthusiasm surrounding artificial intelligence (AI), which boosted the outlook for the technology sector. Another significant driver was the economic resilience observed in both the US and Canada. Data releases were generally robust, defying widely predicted recession expectations, leading investors to defer the anticipated onset of a recession. However, persistently strong inflation releases prompted central banks to implement further interest rate hikes. All in, the Bank of Canada and the US Federal Reserve raised their target rates by 50 basis points (bps) and 75 bps, respectively, during the period. Nevertheless, equity market volatility decreased significantly by the end of the period and bond market volatility also retraced from unusually high levels.

The Fund’s performance was positive for the first half of the year. Shorter-term bond yields increased during the period, while longer-term yields declined, leading to further yield curve inversion. Credit spreads generally tightened, notwithstanding some volatility in March in response to US regional bank stresses. Security selection detracted from performance driven by long positions in select US telecommunications and packaging companies, as well the industry tilt in favour of US telecommunications and away from retail and homebuilders. Within macro strategies, interest rate positioning contributed to performance, driven by duration positioning and the global relative value position that favoured US Treasuries relative to Canada government bonds. The yield curve strategy was neutral for performance while sector positioning detracted.

## **Leverage**

Leverage occurs when the Fund borrows money or securities, or uses derivatives, to generate investment exposure that is greater than the amount invested.

The Fund's leverage is determined by calculating the aggregate exposure through the sum of following: (i) the market value of the Fund's short positions; (ii) the amount of cash borrowed for investment purposes; and (iii) the notional value of the Fund's specified derivatives positions excluding any specified derivatives used for hedging purposes. The Fund's exposure to leverage must not exceed 300% of the Fund's Net Asset Value ("NAV").

During the period ended June 30, 2023, the Fund's aggregate exposure ranged from 117.1% to 186.0% of the Fund's NAV. The aggregate exposure to leverage was within the expected range as outlined in the simplified prospectus. As at June 30, 2023, the Fund's aggregate exposure was 134.4% of the Fund's NAV. The primary sources of leverage were short positions in fixed income securities, short positions in short term investments and short bond futures.

A component of the Fund's leverage is cash borrowing, comprised of bank indebtedness with prime brokers. Such facilities are repayable on demand. During the period ended June 30, 2023, the Fund's range of bank indebtedness was \$Nil to \$2,134,902 with an average interest rate of 8.95%. As at June 30, 2023, the borrowing represented 1.1% of the Fund's NAV.

## **Recent Developments**

Economic releases were generally robust during the second quarter, with the economy bolstered by a combination of fiscal support and the continued drawdown of consumer and business excess savings that had accumulated during the pandemic. We continue to believe that a recession is the most likely scenario within the next year, as evidence of slowing economic momentum builds globally, excess cash savings are depleted and central banks raise interest rates further to combat inflationary pressures. We have, however, extended our expected timing for the recession. As central banks have resumed their interest rate increases, we also believe the risk of a deeper downturn has increased. Regardless, we continue to believe that monetary policymakers are approaching the end of their interest rate hiking cycles, although we do not expect interest rate cuts until the onset of a recession.

CFI is affiliated with Connor, Clark & Lunn Financial Group Ltd. As disclosed in the prospectus and annual information form, the portfolio manager retained by the Fund, Connor, Clark & Lunn Investment Management Ltd., is also affiliated with Connor, Clark & Lunn Financial Group Ltd. During the period ended June 30, 2023, no additions or deletions were made to the portfolio managers providing services to the Fund.

As Manager, CFI receives management and performance fees with respect to the day-to-day business and operations of the Fund, calculated based on the net asset value of each respective series of units of the Fund, as described in the section entitled “Management and Performance Fees”. These management and performance fees are charged in the normal course of business and are measured at their exchange amount, which approximates that of an arm’s length transaction.

### **Recommendations or reports by the Independent Review Committee**

The Independent Review Committee tabled no special reports and made no reportable material recommendations to the manager of the Fund during the period ended June 30, 2023.

(3) The manager of the Fund, CC&L Funds Inc., may waive certain fees or absorb certain expenses otherwise payable by the Fund. The amount of expenses waived or absorbed is determined periodically on a series by series basis at the discretion of the manager and the manager can terminate the waiver or absorption at any time.

(4) The Fund's portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively the Fund's portfolio advisor manages its portfolio investments. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to the Fund buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the year. The higher a fund's portfolio turnover rate in a year, the greater the trading costs payable by the fund in the year, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of a fund.

(5) The trading expense ratio represents margin interest, borrow fees on investments sold short, total commissions and other portfolio transaction costs expressed as an annualized percentage of daily average net asset value during the period.

## MANAGEMENT AND PERFORMANCE FEES

### Management Fees

The Fund is managed by CFI. As consideration for providing investment advisory and management services, CFI receives a management fee from the Fund, based on the net asset value of the respective series, calculated daily and payable monthly in arrears. In respect of units of all series of the Fund other than Series I, the management fee is paid by the Portfolio to CFI. Management fees in respect of Series I units are arranged directly and charged outside the Portfolio. Management fees on Series I units are not expenses of the Portfolio. CFI uses a portion of management fees to pay for trailing commissions to registered dealers (if applicable) based on amounts invested in the Fund. CFI uses the remaining portion of the management fees to pay for investment advice, including fees charged by the Fund's portfolio manager, and general administration expenses and retains the balance for profit. The following table summarizes the annual management fee rates (excluding GST and HST) of each series of the Fund, expressed as a percentage of the Fund's value, and the portion used for dealer compensation and the portion used for or attributed to investment advice, general administration and profit.

### Performance Fees

The Fund pays a quarterly performance fee to the Manager, calculated and accrued daily. The performance fee is based on the performance of a Series of the Fund relative to the performance of the Fund's hurdle and is equal to 15% of the amount by which the Fund outperforms the hurdle. The performance fee is applicable to Series A and Series F units. Unitholders of Series I units may negotiate a performance fee to be paid by the investor directly to the Manager. The FTSE Canada 91 Day T-bill Index return is the hurdle for the Fund.

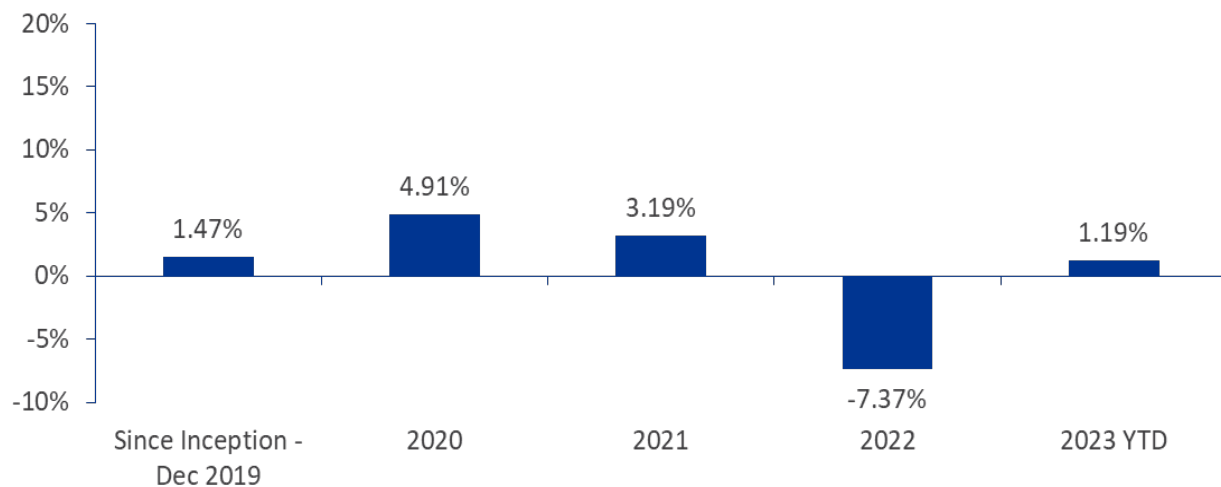
### Past Performance

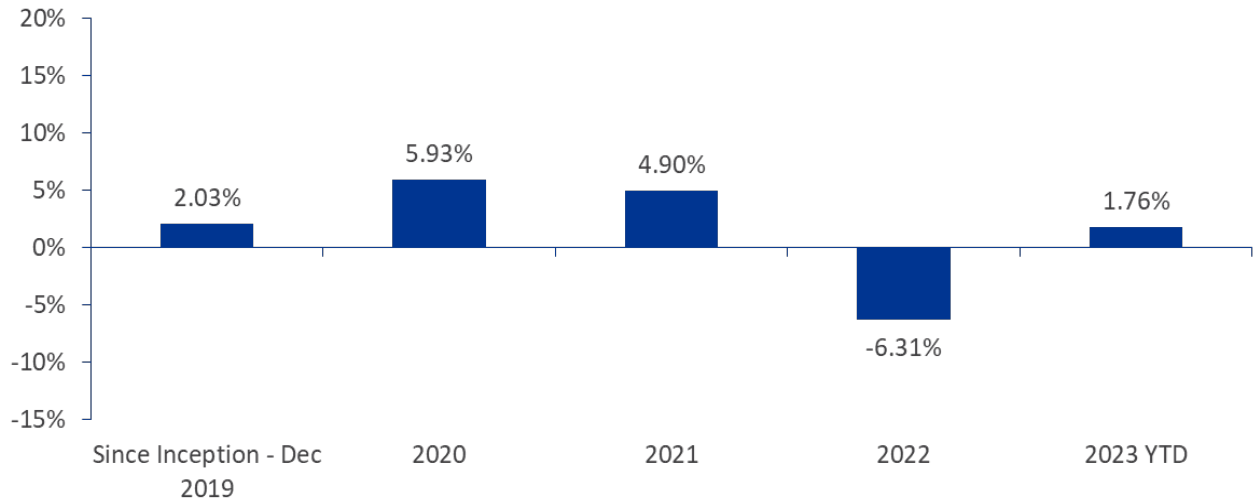

Performance for 2019 represents returns from February 15 to December 31, 2019.

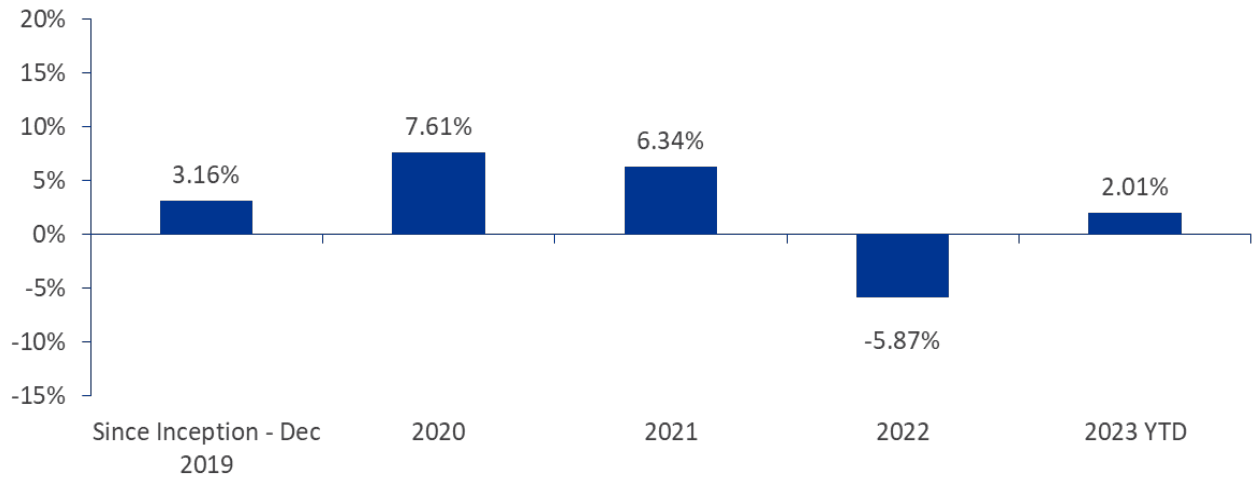

Performance for 2019 represents returns from February 15 to December 31, 2019.

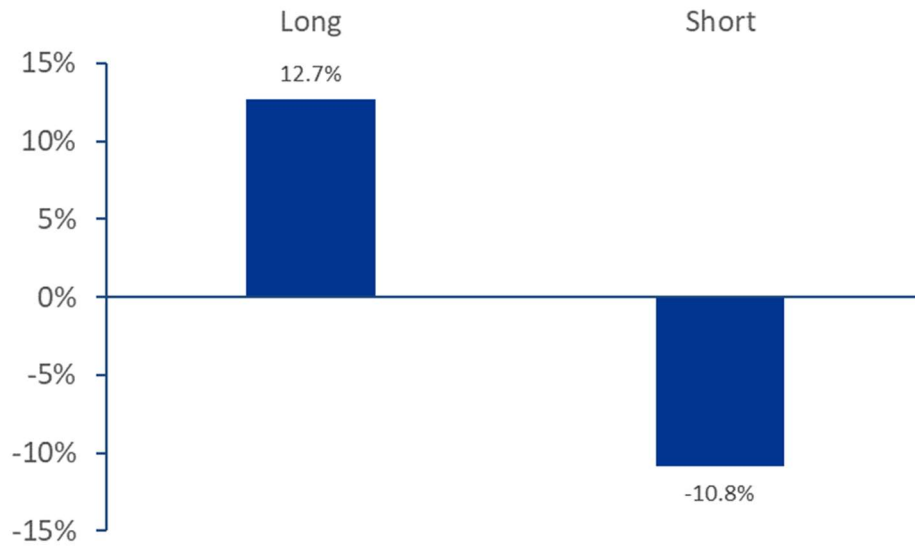
